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THE VICAR'S LETTER

Dear friends,

The year 2023 was marked by a gradual numerical increase in attendance at worship at all services. Apart from the 10am Eucharist, attendance now exceeds numbers in 2019; the 10.00am service has seen a very slow growth and by the end of the year was approaching pre-pandemic numbers. The number of regular worshippers online has been static, and research has shown that this is valued by those unable to attend church because of infirmity.

On the first Sundays in January, February and March, all services were held in the Hall so that the Church was not heated on these Sundays as part of our aim to reduce our carbon footprint. November and December were also included. In February the bird netting to the Belfry was replaced and the internal spaces in the Tower were professionally cleaned to remove pigeon quano.

Lent, Holy Week and Easter were celebrated in full with good attendances. In May we once again had the Rogation Sunday walk "Beating the Bounds" by a small group of walkers. At the APCM Ben Read and Louise Wallis were elected for a further year as Churchwardens. Terrence Hancock and Mel Crighton continued as PCC Secretary and Treasure respectively, and I thank them all for their wise counsel and support. In May we also joined in with the Coronation celebrations of King Charles and Queen Camilla.

Community Lunch was restarted in the Spring and attendance has increased month on month. My thanks to Paul Selvadurai and the team of volunteers for their hard work. However, with this, and other areas of church life, we are finding it difficult to find willing volunteers. We are not alone in this as many churches and charities have been struggling in the same way since the Pandemic. This will remain a challenge in 2024.

In July we held a family barbeque at Messy Church which was very busy. So many people volunteer to help with Messy Church ably led by Rachel Potter. In October we held an all-age Harvest Thanksgiving Service followed by a Harvest Supper.

Over the summer we carried out improvement works to the Hall which included sanding and sealing the floor, redecoration of the walls and woodwork in the Hall, Foyer and Toilets, and in October replacing the flooring in the Foyer. Hall use has increased over the year.

Our services for All Souls', Remembrance Sunday, Advent and Christmas were well supported and followed the pattern of previous years. I am grateful to all the volunteers that deliver our Christmas and Easter cards giving details of all our services.

In December the Winter Night Shelter run by Renewed Hope resumed after a break of several years. It quickly showed that there is a real need for shelter and housing in this area.

There are so many people who work behind the scenes, and I thank them all. The parish would not function without the hard work of our Parish Administrator and my PA, Alexia Hartman. She works far more than her contracted hours and is always available to help. My thanks to her, especially as she has now taken on the responsibility of being Deanery Secretary and PA. The Ministry Team consisting of me, Reverend Reg Grant, Ian Archer, Sarah Cousins and Susannah Dyde works as a unit. My thanks to them for their hard work and support.

We look forward to the next year. The Church is the people that gather together at our various services and we will be looking to see how we can make more connections between our different congregations.

SUSTAINABILITY AT ST MARK'S

The Sustainability Committee continued to focus on energy efficiency this year, but also started to look more widely at other sustainability projects.

Green Sundays have continued, with services on the first Sunday of winter months held in the hall to reduce carbon emissions, save money, and raise awareness of the Church of England's commitments to reach Net Zero by 2030. St Mark's has also **switched energy provider to Octopus Energy** for the Hall gas supply and for electricity supply to the entire site. This has resulted in a 7081kg reduction in CO2 emissions – the equivalent of planting 3541 trees.

The Committee has explored options to install **Electric Vehicle (EV) chargers** in the car park, with a view to optimising 'excess' energy provided by the solar panels during the day, when electricity use on the site is lower. The right installation model could also potentially generate some income for St Mark's. Some complications around feasibility as well as upfront

costs have so far made this proposal impractical to progress, but the Committee will continue to explore any suitable opportunities as the EV charging market develops.

Beyond energy efficiency, the Committee has started to look at opportunities for St Mark's to move towards becoming a **zero waste** church. This would primarily improve sustainability but could also over the longer term reduce some costs as well. The Committee has contacted a local organisation that provides products made from more sustainable materials, and in returnable packaging, and is currently working with them on developing a list of groceries and cleaning products that we could source from them. In addition, **green guidelines** are now being used in the gardens, meaning that weedkiller is only used on paths, and all plant improvement methods are now sustainable.

The progress made on sustainability this year contributes to the **Eco Church** credentials that St Mark's is working towards and we hope to be in a position to obtain silver status next year.

ELECTORAL ROLL

If your name is on the Electoral Roll then you are entitled to vote at the Annual Parish Church Meeting and in this way to feel much more a part of St Mark's Church. Once you reach your sixteenth birthday you are eligible to make an application. The only stipulation is that you must have been baptised, though not necessarily confirmed. You need to live in the parish to go on the Roll immediately, (please ask me if you have any doubts about where the parish boundaries lie) or if you live outside the parish and have habitually worshipped at St Mark's for six months. You can apply by filling in the simple, self-explanatory form available from me or from the Parish Office. Completed forms should please be handed to either myself or to the Parish Office.

The Roll is normally on display in the church and contains only names. It is open until two weeks before the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, when it will be closed for revision.

At the beginning of 2023 we had 164 names on the roll. During the year six have sadly died and one new name has been added. The roll at 31 December stands at 159.

So as to keep the Roll as up to date as possible I would be grateful to be told of any changes in address, or people moving away from the parish, as I do not always hear of these details immediately.

SOCIAL EVENTS

Although we do not have a formal Social or Events Committee at present (something we hope to re-establish in 2024) many volunteers came together to prepare food and refreshments for the various events at St Mark's.

In May we celebrated the King's Coronation with Afternoon Tea enjoyed by over sixty people followed by an All-Age service in Church. Thanks to everyone who made cakes and scones and to those who served the tea and helped set up and clear away afterwards.

In October our Harvest Supper was again held after the monthly family service with over 70 people of all ages socialising together whilst enjoying cottage pie and chocolate or lemon tart with vegetarian, vegan, gluten free and dairy free options. Thanks to everyone who was involved in preparing and cooking the food as well as setting up the tables, arranging flowers, serving food and drinks and of course washing up and clearing away afterwards.

A team of volunteers prepares a hot meal for around 50/60 people as part of the monthly Messy Church services allowing families to enjoy quality time together.

Coffee and biscuits were served after the All Souls service in November giving everyone time to reflect and remember loved ones.

In the run up to Christmas the parents of Holmesdale and Micklefield children were offered tea and coffee before watching the nativity performances and they were very grateful to be able to come in from the cold and enjoy a warm drink.

Once again our Christmas Carol Service attracted a large congregation and we served mulled wine and mince pies to around 100 people in the hall afterwards.

Thank you to all who have volunteered this year to make these events a success and give our church community the chance to join together in social activities. Special thanks go to Nigel Perkins for organising coffee each week and to all the many helpers who volunteer giving everyone the opportunity to catch up with friends after the weekly service.

All these social events require a team effort and it would be great to be able to arrange more events in 2024. If this is something with which you would like to get involved please get in touch with me or any member of the Parochial Church Council.

MUSIC AT SAINT MARK'S

At the 10.00am Sung Eucharist on Sunday mornings St Thomas Mass setting written by David Thorne is used. This is a particularly good setting for congregational singing and indeed is now used by many churches in preference to settings by John Rutter and Richard Shepherd.

We are very grateful for the help provided by members of St Mark's Singers. This was particularly welcome on three special occasions during the past year – Easter Sunday and the Carol Service in December.

I am very grateful to David Lear who plays the piano at the monthly Taizé service and to Toby Garrood who looks after the music on the 2nd Sunday morning of each month giving me an opportunity for a Sunday "off duty".

Other musical events take place too. Cantamus have made a couple of appearances during the year as have the Dunottar School Choir. We had four visits during the year from the St Mary's Choir who came to sing Choral Evensong for us. Very rarely do we get an opportunity to hear the choral music of the great English composers — William Byrd, Thomas Weelkes, Charles Stanford, Edward Elgar to mention just four. So it is good that St Mary's come along to give us a chance to hear music sung to a cathedral standard.

St Mark's Singers

St Mark's Singers has now been established for over eight years. We meet on a Monday evening and welcome anyone who enjoys singing. We have a range of abilities from former cathedral choristers to those who have never been in a choir before. We now have over 20 regular attendees and sing once a month at Sunday Eucharist. We sing a range of music from traditional pieces to spirituals and gospel, and this year we have again been singing some secular music for non-service performances.

We entered the Reigate and Redhill Music Festival again this year in May and were awarded merit plus for our performances of 'Love Divine' and 'Yesterday'.

In September we took part in the SMOATathon singing a range of pieces which were warmly received – Love Divine, Something Inside so Strong, For the Beauty of the Earth, He will hold me fast, The Prayer, And so it Goes and finished off with a medley of O When the Saints.

Many of us joined the choir for the funeral of our dear friend Janet Burns who sang with us for several years and had been a member of St Mark's Church choir for over 40 years. The service included Ave Verum which was one of her favourites.

At Christmas we sang at the Carol Service and at the First Communion of Christmas on Christmas Eve.

In 2024 we will again be entering the music festival and hope to be able to put on a concert later in the year.

SAINT MARK'S OVERSEAS AID TRUST (SMOAT)

In 2023 we gave away £21,500 to 12 projects in seven different countries. This amount includes £8,500 given to the Christmas Appeal 2021. We also received a modest bequest from one of our long-standing supporters.

The spread of countries we have given to this year has not been as wide as last year. However, we consider many factors when we are deciding which organisations and projects to support. Basic need is one of the top influences. This will explain the smaller spread. This year, we have also given to five new organisations to us. We take enormous care to make sure the organisations are legitimate and meet our remit and part of this process is forging good, personal relationships with those organisations so that we can keep communications open at all times and seek complete transparency.

In March we held our ever-popular Beetle Drive which, once again, was very well attended and enjoyed by all ages. The organisation we were supporting was Project Uganda, one of our long-standing partners. Like many charities, they struggled through Covid and all their work ceased until recently. We were able to send them £1,500 towards a rainwater harvesting project in one of its schools in Uganda. It is all too easy to take for granted the plentiful supply of water we have in this country. The rainwater harvesting system erected at the school will not only provide clean drinking water, but it will also improve sanitation and limit the spread of disease.

We ran another SMOAT@Home afternoon tea in July and delivered scones all over Reigate and into Redhill. The event was on the day of the Men's Final at Wimbledon and it is hoped that people were able to watch the tennis whilst eating a beautiful homemade scone! With the proceeds, we sent £1,500 to Cecily's Fund, an organisation new to us which had taken over one of our partners, Kaloko Trust. With the money, they were able to provide books and educational provisions to two schools in the Kitwe District and Luansobe in Zambia.

In September we held a SMOATathon, a wonderful event filled with hours of continuous music and entertainment. We were able to send £2,000 to the Tea Leaf Trust, another new organisation for us, to provide training to 378 students who would then go on to teach English to 4,000 students in 73 centres in Sri Lanka.

All other money given away was funded by regular giving and supported the following projects:

We gave £1,000 in February to Afrinspire to fund the building of a shallow well and latrines at Chibondo School in the Lunga region of Zambia. We acted as match funders as part of the Big Give.

In August we gave £1,000 to Workaid to fund the development of infrastructure for vocational training in three rural schools in Zambia.

£1,000 was donated in October to Team Kenya (another new organisation for us) to provide STEM education for a girls' empowerment project in Ndhiwa, Kenya. This was part of the Big Give, so our donation was doubled by match funding.

We gave £2,000 in November to East Africa Children's Project to help finance the build of a dormitory in a school in Uganda; we gave £1,500 to African Promise (another new organisation for us) to provide funding towards the cost of a school garden project in

South East Kenya; we gave £1,000 to Rainforest Saver (another new organisation for us) for inga alley cropping, which facilitates farming in Cameroon; and finally we gave £500 to Deki (another new organisation to us) towards the building of healthcare hubs in Togo. The latter two projects were also part of the Big Give.

As you can see, the majority of the money we give away is from our regular givers to the tune of around £11,000 (we top up all fund-raising events too). If you don't already, please consider giving regularly, it makes such a difference to what we are able to give.

On that note, I will take this opportunity to thank everyone who has supported us this year. Without you, we wouldn't be here!

Regular Giving

Regular donations are so important to enable us to plan for the coming year in the knowledge that the funds will be available when required. We aim to raise around £90,000 per year from regular donations including Gift Aid. To make regular giving easier we have joined a national scheme supported by the Diocese - the **Parish Giving Scheme** (or PGS for short). We receive 100% of your donation and Gift Aid is automatically claimed for us which reduces administration. Leaving a legacy

Legacy gifts can make a huge difference to churches. Each year, gifts in wills, ranging from £100s to £100,000s are received. Faithful witnesses leaving generous legacies have enabled churches to invest in their buildings, pioneer new ministries, and sustain a welcoming presence in their communities.

Why should you write a will?

Writing a will means you choose:

- How you would like to share your property and possessions;
- Who you would like to look after any children under the age of 18;
- How to support any charities or churches that are important to you.

Without a will, these decisions will be made according to pre-ordained rules, and by the courts, which may be different from your wishes. Leaving a will gives you peace of mind and lifts a burden from loved ones after you are gone.

To make it easier the Church of England has partnered with Farewill, the UK's favourite will-writer, so anyone can write a simple will online for free, in as little as 30 minutes. You can find out more by visiting https://farewill.com/southwarkdiocese.

We strongly advise seeing a solicitor for more complicated wills, or for people wishing to review their existing will or add a codicil.

A gift for future generations

After you have made provision for your family and friends, we hope you'll also consider leaving a gift in your will to St Mark's. A legacy is a valuable expression of how meaningful a church has been during your time there. It's a way to give thanks - a lasting testimony to the faithfulness, goodness and generosity of God.

The policy of the PCC is to use legacies to help fund additional mission or development projects in the parish, whether buildings, equipment or staff. Circumstances change over the years, so church members are encouraged to leave legacies for the general purposes of the parish. The PCC will discuss the most appropriate use of the legacy in the light of current projects and the donor's known areas of interest in the church (for example, children and youth, music, buildings).

You may also receive tax benefits for including a gift to St Mark's in your will. A gift in your will to a charity is free of inheritance tax and may also reduce the amount of tax payable on the rest of your will. <u>Find out more here.</u>

OTHER ACTIVITIES

FOODBANK

As the Cost of Living crisis continued, the St Matthew's Foodbank has found it challenging to meet the need. More people are using the Foodbank for the first time, yet donations have dropped. Added to this, the storage units at St Matthew's had to be removed. We have continued to collect food and toiletries that are delivered to the Foodbank. The collection point has continued on the Vicarage doorstep. We pray that all who come for help and support will receive it.

WINTER NIGHT SHELTER

The Winter Night Shelter is operated by the charity Renewed Hope to offer a safe place to sleep for local homeless people during the coldest months of the year, with a cooked evening meal and breakfast. It runs from mid-December to late February or March and moves between different churches in Reigate, Redhill and Horley. It is staffed by volunteers, many of whom are based at the churches. St Mark's has been hosting the Shelter since the winter of 2015/16.

Following a three-year break when central government provided local authorities with sufficient funds to bring everyone in off the street, initially to reduce the spread of covid-19, there was a need to re-start the Shelter for the winter of 2023/24. This report covers our sixth winter of hosting when St Mark's church hall was the venue on 6 Friday nights from 15 December 2023 to 19 January 2024.

This winter, the Shelter hosted around 30 guests for at least one night. Some stayed over 30 nights. Some of the guests had only just become homeless, so the Shelter saved them from spending any nights on the streets. At St Mark's we hosted around 4 to 6 guests in

December, increasing to 7 guests by the time we finished hosting in January. This was similar to the overall average of 6 guests across all venues.

For each night that the Shelter operated, there were 21 duties that needed to be filled by volunteers, giving a total of 126 duties at St Mark's. Once again, volunteers were forthcoming to take on almost all of the required roles so everything ran smoothly.

We are indebted to all of our volunteers, but especially to our supervisors whose roles carry the most responsibility. As always, all the volunteers seemed to get a lot out of their involvement with the programme and the guests were certainly very grateful for the accommodation and welcome we provided.
